Saturday School is Back at Newman Grove

In an attempt to help students keep up with their homework and improve their overall grades in classes where they are struggling, Saturday School has been reinstituted at Newman Grove. The following criteria are reasons a student can be assigned to Saturday School and the consequences of not attending:

6th tardy within a particular class period or excessive absences/tardies (administrative discretion)

Consistently turns in incomplete or late homework

Continual inappropriate behavior

Behavior that is disruptive or detrimental to the learning environment, depending on severity.

Any student failing two or more classes may be assigned

Students who are outwardly disrespectful to any staff member

Rules:

- Saturday School will consist of three and a half hours, from 8:00 through 11:30 a.m. Doors will be open from 7:45 through 8:00 a.m. Any student arriving after 8:00 a.m. will be refused admission and will be considered truant.
- The only exception for attendance at Saturday School will be illness. Calls for illness should be made between 7:45 and 8:00 a.m. on that Saturday to 447-6294.
- Students who are truant from Saturday School will be suspended out-of-school for the next day that school is in session and will be assigned to two days of Saturday School.
- Students who violate Saturday School rules will be required to leave the school grounds, resulting in out-of-school suspension and reassignment of two days of Saturday School.

Any student may chose to come to Saturday School to get work done but they must arrive by 8:00. Please have a parent call the school so we know to expect someone not assigned.

Another month has flown by and graduation is in sight for the seniors. I am reiterating last month's information on tasks that seniors should be starting to complete. The first task is obtaining a PIN number for the FAFSA. This is done at the web-site <u>www.pin.ed.gov</u> Both the student and parents need a PIN. Your PIN is an electronic access code that serves as your personal identifier and can be used every year to electronically apply for federal student aid and to access your U.S. Department of Education records online. Parents; if you have already obtained a PIN for previous children, then you do not need another one. Students must have their own. Most seniors have obtained a pin in senior careers class. Do not lose your PIN as you will need it through all your college years.

After receiving your PIN, you should apply for federal student financial assistance by completing the FAFSA. Even if you do not need assistance, everyone should fill out the FAFSA because colleges use this information in helping with many other things such as scholarships. Federal student loan interest rates are lower than any other loans so you are encouraged to fill out the FAFSA to see what you qualify for. The fastest way to fill out the FAFSA and to get results back is to do it online electronically. The web-site is www.fafsa.ed.gov A FAFSA on the Web Worksheet is available online at www.fafsa.ed.gov or www.FederalStudentAid.ed.gov/ pubs for you to print and write down your information prior to completing the online submission of the FAFSA. You can obtain printed copies of the worksheet by calling 1-800-4-FED-AID (1-800-433-3243). Apply for the FAFSA between Jan. 1, 2015 and June 30, 2015. The sooner the better as colleges may have their own deadlines which usually can be as early as February. You need to have your income tax information finished or close to finished to apply. There is a tool at www.fafsa.ed.gov called the FAFSA4caster that can help students and families prepare financially for college before officially applying for federal student aid. It provides an estimate of federal student aid eligibility by instantly calculating an estimated Expected Family Contribution* - the indicator used to estimate a family's or student's ability to contribute toward the cost of an education after high school.

Information that you will need to fill out the FAFSA

- Social Security #
- 2014 W-2 forms and other records of money earned by student and parents, if you're a de-

pendent student

- 2014 Federal Income Tax Returns and W2's
- A PIN number for both parents and student (www.pin.ed.gov)
- <u>The Education Quest website</u> <u>(www.educationquest.org) gives great tutorials</u> <u>for filling out the FASFA. It goes over each ques-</u> <u>tion and helps answer any questions you may</u> <u>have.</u>
- A link to the FASFA and Education Quest websites are posted on our school website.
- 2014 untaxed income records examples include Social Security benefits, welfare benefits such as Temporary Assistance to Needy Families (TANF) and veteran benefits.
- Current bank statements, business and investment mortgage information; business and farm records; and stock, bond and other investment records.
- Alien registration number (if you are not a U.S. citizen).

Other important information

- You should never pay to fill out the FAFSA. Check the web address to make sure it ends in gov.
- I have a booklet "Funding Education Beyond High School" that students or parents can pick up.
- A link to the FASFA and Education Quest websites are posted on our school website.
- Northeast Community College is offering free assistance through their Financial Aid Office at the College Welcome Center on Fridays from 1pm -4pm between February and June 2015 with no appointment necessary (excluding days the college is closed). You will need: 2014 Federal Tax returns and W2's and a PIN number for both parent and student (www.pin.ed.gov)
- Seniors should visit and then apply to colleges they are seriously considering.

Scholarships

- An updated list of scholarships is available in the counseling office for students to pick up. There is also a link on our school web-site. <u>Bluejay</u> <u>Foundation and local scholarship packets will</u> <u>be distributed to all seniors soon. All these</u> <u>scholarships have an April 1st deadline.</u>
- Please notify me of any scholarships earned so that proper recognition can be given at graduation. This includes all scholarships earned, even those not accepted.





REBELLING AGAINST LOW EXPECTATIONS

Five years ago, I read a book by two teenagers named Alex and Brett Harris. Maybe you read it too—it was called *Do Hard Things*, and it challenged their peers to not settle into the lifestyle of a typical high school or college student, getting lost in selfies, video games, Facebook updates and narcissism. They gave credence to the idea that we become the best version of ourselves when we "do hard things."

I love it. "There are so many ways in which doing hard things as a teenager and in college prepared me for what I'm doing today," Alex says, who is in his last year at Harvard Law School. He is an editor of the prestigious *Harvard Law Review* and plans to clerk for the 10th Circuit Court of Appeals next year in Colorado. The hard choices weren't always big ones—opting to read rather than watch TV, to study rather than play video games, to join the debate team rather than the basketball team. <u>http://therebelution.com/about/alex-brett-harris/#.VL65E1sTne0</u>

"Doing hard things in one season prepares you to step into the next with momentum and purpose," he wisely points out. Their books and their challenge (<u>the Rebelution movement</u>) was launched by teens, for teens, and frankly, I believe that's far more effective than a challenge from some Baby Boomer or Gen Xer. Everything these guys do is counter-cultural and counter intuitive in our current world of speed, comfort, and convenience... and it's really working for them. "That's because rebelling against low expectations and doing hard things is a mindset that grows with you," his brother Brett affirms.

What This Means Today

Now here's the clincher: Brett still works with their *Rebelution* movement but has spent most of the past two years caring full-time for his wife, Ana, who suffers from Lyme disease. A tick-borne illness, Lyme disease has serious implications if left untreated. Ana was probably bitten when she was 10 but wasn't diagnosed until a few months after their marriage. Along with maintaining doctors' appointments and medical options, Brett cooks for her, bathes her, carries her up the stairs, and, during her sickest months, helped her manage the panic attacks induced by the bacterial infection in her brain. Wow... talk about a whole new application for "doing hard things." It now surrounds caring for his disabled wife—nothing glitzy or glamorous, nothing the media wants to cover or photograph. But listen to Brett's rationale for how he handles his current hardship: *If I'd spent my teen years running away from responsibility and difficulty, what would I do now? I could have zoned out, played video games, and found ways to escape. I could have pushed the responsibility onto her parents instead of taking that on myself.*

Our Take Away

As I mused about these two guys in their mid-twenties now, I was challenged in my own parenting, teaching, coaching and training of students. These guys "got it" when they were teenagers. Somehow, the adults in their life weren't consumed with "preventing" tough things from happening, but preparing the boys for life. Let me offer some principles we must buy into if we're to do the same with our students:

- We must communicate that everything they do now either prepares or ill-prepares them for the future. Each stage is a rehearsal for the next stage.
- We must enable them to see the long-term ramifications of their actions.
- We must teach them to check their motives for what they do. Is it all about getting noticed or famous... or is it about their development?
- We must equip them to take on difficult challenges, knowing this acts as a workout for future challenges.

I love the advice Alex and Brett have for parents today: "We can't shield our kids from hardship and then hope to release them into a suffering-free existence in adulthood. Loving your children means preparing them for hardship by allowing them to engage with the world, deal with the consequences of their actions, and work through inevitable disappointments and failures."

Great way to enter 2015, don't you think?






