Board of Education Meeting Summary February 8, 2016

- The meeting was called to order at 6:00 p.m. with all members present.
- The agenda was approved as published; minutes of the January 11, 2016 meeting were approved as printed.
- The March 14th meeting will be held at 8:30 p.m., following the spring play.
- Curriculum reports were provided by Preschool and K-6 teachers.
- Representatives from Ayars and Ayars presented information regarding a possible feasibility study for the district.
- The Activities Director's report was presented by Karla Patzel. Information was included on Sing Across Nebraska, the spring play and speech season, wrestling (districts and state tournament in the next two weeks), girls and boys basketball (subdistricts held in February), and PA/sound system for the gym.
- The Counselor's report was presented. Information was included on seniors and graduation, testing, and working on class schedules for the 2016-17 school year.
- Principal Barnes' report included Winter Homecoming (improved attendance over last year), completion of NeSA writing tests, movement in teaching assignments due to additional staffing, and a decrease in attendance at spring Parent-Teacher Conferences.
- Superintendent Shalikow's report included information on the NRCSA Spring Conference, the district's student information system, NCLB review on March 7th, lunch bonanza on March 9th, the football scoreboard, 9th street curb and gutter project, high school furnace repair (\$5,500), and a quote from Midwest Music on a PA/sound system for the gym.
- The Treasurer's Report was accepted as presented.
- Claims were approved for payment in the amounts of \$28,348.64-General Fund; \$1,090.90-Depreciation Fund; and \$4,850.00-Building Fund).
- Approved the purchase of a 24-inch Tomcat auto scrubber for the custodial department for \$7,737.05.
- Approved the proposal of Ayars and Ayars to conduct a feasibility study in the amount of \$29,590.00.
- Approved the 2016-2017 school calendar as proposed. The calendar calls for 174 student days and 185 teacher days. The first day of school for students will be August 17th.
- Approved 2016-2017 contracts with ESU #8 (Distance Learning, Nursing Services, Special Education, and Technology Services).
- Approved the 2016-2017 contract for Principal Darrell Barnes.
- Approved the 2016-2017 teaching contract of Megan Goeden as 7-12 Language Arts instructor.
- $\bullet\,$ Approved the 2016-2017 elementary teaching contract of Cristina Hanzel
- Entered into Executive Session at 7:23 p.m. to discuss personnel. Returned to public session at 7:27 p.m.
- Accepted the resignation of Michele Schmidt as technology/business instructor. Mrs. Schmidt has served the district for 33 years.
- Entered into Executive Session at 7:28 p.m. to discuss a student issue. Returned to public session at 7:42 p.m.
- Meeting was adjourned at 7:43 p.m.




From the Desk of Superintendent Mikal Shalikow

Sportsmanship at BC/NG

Good sportsmanship is always a goal of our schools as we participate in the ever tough and competitive Mid-State Conference. It is an expectation of our coaches, athletes, parents, and spectators at all events. Other schools and communities judge us by what they see on the field, the courts, the mats, and in the stands just as we judge other schools. It is imperative that we send a positive message about our schools and communities in the way we act at events throughout the various seasons. Coaches and athletes send the message you want your fans to learn. Parents and spectators send the message you want your children to learn. Good Sportsmanship is a reputation to be earned.

NeSA Testing

The State writing test has been completed by the 4th, 8th, and 11th grade. The results of these will be back to the schools sometime in Mid-April or early May. The next window for the testing of Reading, Math, and Science begins on March 21 with the ending date of May 6. Grades 3-8 and 11 will take the Math and Reading tests while grades 5, 8, and 11 will be taking the Science tests. These tests will be spread out during the entire window of testing but again we ask that, as parents, you encourage your child to get enough sleep and to eat breakfast so they can be fully rested and mentally prepared for the tests. We appreciate your efforts in helping your students and the school perform at the highest level possible.

Student Reading

We all know that reading is important but do we ever think of why it is important? Multiple studies tell us that reading aloud to our children at an early age or even while they are still in the womb is important and gives them a head start in school concerning comprehension and vocabulary especially. Listed below are 10 reasons why reading is important in our world:

- 1. Reading is fundamental to our society: Reading road signs, following written directions on a map, the instructions on a pill bottle. Without the ability to read even these things we take for granted can be dangerous.
- 2. Reading is a vital skill in finding a job: Not being able to read and follow directions that come across in written form make it difficult to perform the duties of the job.
- 3. Reading is important because it develops the mind: The mind needs exercise to develop. Reading improves comprehension skills as well as listening skills.
- 4. Reading allows us to discover new things: Most information is available in written form somewhere and in order to learn about new ideas we must be able to read.
- 5. Reading develops the imagination: Being able to read allows us to entertain ourselves and explore anywhere in the world or even out of this world
- 6. Reading develops creativity: When children have the opportunity to create stories it is amazing what they can come up with and being able to read and have a vocabulary allows them to be creative!
- 7. Reading helps develop a good self-image: Studies show that nonreaders tend to have a low opinion of themselves and their abilities. They tend to feel isolated and this is often when behavior issues occur. Reading more helps!
- 8. Reading skills improve spelling: This is true especially in a phonics reading program. It also expands the vocabulary and lets children know what contexts words should be used in.

Another month has flown by and graduation is in sight for the seniors. I am reiterating last month's information on tasks that seniors should be starting to complete. The first task is obtaining a FAFSA ID. This is done at the web-site fsaid.ed.gov. Both the student and parents need an ID. Your ID is a username and password that serves as your personal identifier and can be used every year to electronically apply for federal student aid and to access your U.S. Department of Education records online. Parents; if you have already obtained a FSA ID for previous children, then you do not need another one. Students must have their own. Most seniors have obtained a FSA ID in senior careers class. Do not lose your FSA ID as you will need it through all your college years.

After receiving your FSA ID, you should apply for federal student financial assistance by completing the FAFSA. Even if you do not need assistance, everyone should fill out the FAFSA because colleges use this information in helping with many other things such as scholarships. Federal student loan interest rates are lower than any other loans so you are encouraged to fill out the FAFSA to see what you qualify for. The fastest way to fill out the FAFSA and to get results back is to do it online electronically. The web-site is www.fafsa.ed.gov A FAFSA on the Web Worksheet is available online at www.fafsa.ed.gov or www.FederalStudentAid.ed.gov/ pubs for you to print and write down your information prior to completing the online submission of the FAFSA. You can obtain printed copies of the worksheet by calling 1-800-4-FED-AID (1-800-433-3243). Apply for the FAFSA between Jan. 1, 2016 and June 30, 2016. The sooner the better as colleges may have their own deadlines which usually can be as early as February. You need to have your income tax information finished or close to finished to apply. There is a tool at www.fafsa.ed.gov called the FAFSA4caster that can help students and families prepare financially for college before officially applying for federal student aid. It provides an estimate of federal student aid eligibility by instantly calculating an estimated Expected Family Contribution* - the indicator used to estimate a family's or student's ability to contribute toward the cost of an education after high school.

Information that you will need to fill out the FAFSA

- Social Security #
- 2015 W-2 forms and other records of money earned by student and parents, if you're a de-

pendent student

- 2015 Federal Income Tax Returns and W2's
- A FSA ID number for both parents and student (fsaid.ed.gov)
- The Education Quest website
 (www.educationquest.org) gives great tutorials
 for filling out the FASFA. It goes over each question and helps answer any questions you may have.
- A link to the FASFA and Education Quest websites are posted on our school website.
- 2015 untaxed income records examples include Social Security benefits, welfare benefits such as Temporary Assistance to Needy Families (TANF) and veteran benefits.
- Current bank statements, business and investment mortgage information; business and farm records; and stock, bond and other investment records.
- Alien registration number (if you are not a U.S. citizen).

Other important information

- You should never pay to fill out the FAFSA.
 Check the web address to make sure it ends in gov.
- I have a booklet "Funding Education Beyond High School" that students or parents can pick up.
- A link to the FASFA and Education Quest websites are posted on our school website.
- Northeast Community College is offering free assistance through their Financial Aid Office at the College Welcome Center on Fridays from 1pm -4pm between February and June 2016 with no appointment necessary (excluding days the college is closed). You will need: 2015 Federal Tax returns and W2's and a FSA ID number for both parent and student (fsaid.ed.gov)
- Seniors should visit and then apply to colleges they are seriously considering.

Scholarships

- An updated list of scholarships is available in the counseling office for students to pick up. There is also a link on our school web-site. <u>Bluejay</u> <u>Foundation and local scholarship packets have</u> <u>been distributed to all seniors</u>. <u>All these scholarships have an April 1st deadline</u>.
- Please notify me of any scholarships earned so that proper recognition can be given at graduation. This includes all scholarships earned, even those not accepted.

Room 111 Classes

I want to say it has been a very enjoyable time in each of my classes. The classes are small in numbers and we are able to have a lot of interaction in our learning activities.

<u>World History</u> 2 sophomore and 2 junior students have covered numerous countries and are presently studying the Qin Empire of China. We went into depth on their form of government and how they were able to use a differing weights and measure system, a different writing system but yet were able to make an effective set of law codes to govern their people and to build roads and canals that were of high quality. Their skills and system were so well defined they were able to build the Great Wall of China without modern machinery.

It is a great time of year in <u>American Government</u>. These 4 senior students can learn first hand about people running for President by listening to the debates and the critiquing that goes on after the debate. We are able to share ideas with one another and then discuss what the duties of the president or senator consist of and the compensation and benefit which each member of government receives. Now with a little more time in preparing for this class by using actual events, we are able to have some great discussions and learning without a lot of paperwork on the students part.

Five juniors in <u>American History</u> are studying and researching World War I. They study the reason United States become involved in this war, who was on our side and who was the enemy. Another interesting feature of this war, was the use of trench war fare, which was necessary because of the weapons that were used to fight the war.

Our freshmen have a **Skills Class** on Fridays. At the present time, we are working on confidence building skills using activities to build leadership and self esteem. Later in the year, we will work on survival skills like sewing. They will learn to sew on a button, sew a hem and even make a pillow.

The 4 students in <u>World Geography</u> are currently studying Europe. The online system called Lizardpoint.com is being used to do the map testing for this class. In our studies we seek out how landscapes affected the population and culture of each area of Europe.

The <u>Junior High Health Class</u> consisting of 7th & 8th graders meet on Tuesday and Thursday. We use on line videos that discuss each topic and then students answer questions about the paragraphs. The students seem to enjoy this method of learning and are doing very well in the class.



3 Things Parents Must Tell Their Children When They Begin a Musical Instrument By: Tony Mazzocchi

Here are three things parents need to know and be able to express to their child as soon as they begin learning to play a musical instrument:

"You are allowed to fail, and you will become better because of your failures."

There are no red pen marks for missed notes in music the way there are on tests — there is nothing to feel bad about when you play something "wrong" in music. To become skilled at a musical instrument — and to become great at *anything* — one needs to struggle a little. In your child's case, they need to sound bad before they sound good; they need to work on things *just beyond* what they are capable of in order to get better and smarter, and that means they need to make mistakes. There is a small gap between what we all are able to do and where we want to be, and focusing on that gap makes us better learners and better people. Learning a musical instrument allows us to grow from our mistakes.

"Hard works trumps talent every single time."

Practicing a skill over and over, the right way, fires circuits in our brains that solidify that skill. Sure, some people find some skills easier at first than others, but the people who practice that skill daily in order to "burn it" into their brain will always far surpass people who don't practice enough. Practicing a musical instrument helps children learn the universal truth that hard work trumps talent.

"This is a long-term commitment, and we are going to stick with it."

Studies have shown that students who identified that they would play their instrument for longer than one year outperformed students who only committed to one year of playing by up to 400% — practicing the same amount of time if not less! The ideas and mindsets students bring to their musical instrument study have a direct effect on their success, and it's the parents' role to set the tone on the first day by not giving their child an "easy out" to quit. Make the decision to invest in your child's music education for at least a few years of their schooling and you will see results.

What if we as parents treated music like any other core subject and expected our children to study it for at least 4 or 5 years? What does "success in school" mean to you and your child?

There were a few matches that we were very competitive but got caught on our backs and pinned.

Tyson and Andy both won by forfeit.

In JV action Bryton wrestled very well, controlled his match and pinned his man.

In spite of getting beat by a major decision, Jacob became the first wrestler all year to not only go the distance but to even make it to the third period against #1 rated and Chadron State Wrestling recruit Mathew Kindler.

Isaac battled his way to the finals with a hard fought win over the #1 rated heavyweight in Class "D". After a first period takedown Isaac held a 2-0 lead, but fell behind 6-2 after two periods. Earning 5th place, Joel scored the opening takedown in each match he wrestled but got out of position in two of his matches and was pinned as a result.

Levi ended up in a tie for 5th-6th place as both wrestlers had reached their 5 match limit. He had 3 wins by pin and a pair of losses by decision.

Ty and Ryan earned 6th place. Both wrestled the best they have all year. Ty secured two pins. Ryan had a pin, a win by forfeit and a tight 6-4 decision to get to the medal round.

Bryton, Isiah, Garrett, and Jon each went 1-2. Jon just missed out on placing coming up on the short end of a 9-7 sudden victory score. Garrett also dropped a tough 8-6 match to keep him from advancing. Logan had a tough draw having to face the #3 Class "C" man in his first match.

Iowa won a hard fought entertaining 21-11 victory in a great atmosphere. In attendance were Nebraska alumni Jordan Burroughs and James Green. Green is a world Bronze medalist and Burroughs is a three time World Champ and an Olympic Champ. The young Cardinals in attendance had their pictures taken with these wrestling stars.

We had another slow start vs Norfolk Catholic and allowed easy baskets on the defensive end. Our defensive stance was not good, our help side did not rotate like the way we're suppose to, and it felt we were always a step slower on each end of the floor. We gave up offensive rebounds again and that is all an effort deal there so it was disappointing. Offensively we need to regain some confidence in what we are trying to accomplish and not just try to survive and hope we get a shot to fall. We need to develop a more "aggressor" type mindset on each end of the floor and compete on all possessions. Final score was Norfolk Catholic 60 to Boone Central/Newman Grove 29.

BCNG vs Battle Creek

We had a decent start vs BC as we took a 9-6 first quarter lead. We still had a few defensive breakdowns in terms of our rotations and rebounding. Many of these miscues can be masked by better effort, which we saw in the 4th quarter. Halftime saw the Lady Cards down 19-16 as they could not get their shots to fall. We shot 3/8 FT's in the first half so we left some points out there. Those can be momentum builders or killers as we saw in the second half. The second half saw the Lady Cards outscore BC 26-19 with a strong 4th quarter. We switched to a zone press and zone defense which we became the aggressor and it paid off. We closed out the 4th quarter hitting 6/7 FT's which gave us great momentum. We had 12 offensive rebounds which resulted in 10 points off second chances. We had 6 assists and we shared the ball well offensively. We had much better flow and rhythm which gave us many open looks. A great improvement on the offensive side. Jenna had a huge game with 13 pts and 7 rebounds, Tessa had a double double with 10pts 10 rebounds, Bailey was close with 10pts and 8 rebounds and Esmer had a good second half with 6 pts 6 rebounds. Overall, it was a team effort and I am proud of the way our girls came out and competed all 4 quarters against BC. The Lady Cardinals won the game 42-38.

BCNG vs Battle Creek

We turned around and played Battle Creek for the play in game of the first round of the Mid States Conference tournament. This was a disappointing game to say the least. Our girls knew we had to come out and be ready to play right away and a 20-8 first quarter deficit proved too much to overcome. We had 18 first half turnovers and 29 for the game which led to transition points or free throws for Battle Creek. We had 18 the night before and Battle Creek upped their defensive pressure and our girls could not handle it. We did not play with confidence or ball sureness and quite frankly, it looked like we were just trying to survive at times. We discussed some things from the game before and we did not apply what we talked about. We did not use any fakes or look off and our passes were too easy to defend. In the second half Battle Creek got at least one, and most of the time two or more offensive rebounds every possession except one. We harp, drill and practice rebounding every day during the week and when it comes game time, the girls don't apply the effort it takes to rebound. Quite frankly, it did not matter who we played in this game because if our rebounding was as poor as it ever was, we would not have won against any team in the state. The back to back games against Battle Creek really signifies our season of inconsistency - we saw a 27 point swing less than 24 hours. We will continue to improve on the details of the game as we near districts. The final score was 61-38 in favor of Battle Creek.

BCNG vs Grand Island Northwest

We played well at times, again looking for a consistent 4 quarter ball game. When we made them defend us and were patient in our offense, we had good looks at the rim. Defensively, we didn't switch on the actions we were suppose to and they made us pay for it. We need to better communicate, see the ball and player at all times, and have better closeouts - the small things. We also need to minimize their offensive rebounding and take better care of the ball - issues we've talked about all year long. Grand Island Northwest came away with a 53-33 win.






Winter Homecoming 2016
