Board of Education Meeting Summary February 12, 2018

- The meeting of the Board of Education was called to order at 7:30 p.m. by President Krueger. Members answering roll call were Ryan Chilson, Ginger Buhl-Jorgensen, John Krueger, Jeanie McCloud, Scott Nelson, Becky Wallin.
- President Krueger announced that the Open Meetings Act was posted in the room in accordance with the law.
- The agenda was approved as published; minutes of the of the January 8, 2018 meeting were approved as printed.
- The next meeting of the Board of Education will be held on Monday, March 12th at 7:30 p.m.
- Elementary faculty presented information on their programs. The focus was primarily on the use and positive results from extra intervention implemented in the lower elementary grades.
- Monthly reports were provided by Matt Rudloff (Counselor) and Karla Patzel (Activities Director). Mr. Rudloff also introduced his student teacher for the semester, Felicia Reed.
- Principal Barnes provided information on parent/teacher conferences and up-coming NSCAS and ACT testing, reminding the importance of having students get a good night's sleep beforehand.
- Superintendent Shalikow's reported on the NRCSA Spring Conference (March 22-23), Superintendent Education Forum (February 21-22), results from the NDE external review team's visit on February 6th (excellent report), and a visit by the Fire Marshal on January 31, 2018. A written report from the Fire Marshal has been received and will be made public.
- The Treasurer's Report was accepted as presented. Bills totaling \$32,982.26 (General Fund), \$1,390.00 (Depreciation Fund), and \$566.15 (Building Fund). It was also decided to let the maturing CD's #464 and 567 renew.
- Adoption and approval of a resolution calling for a special election to be held in the District regarding the issuance by the District of its general obligation bonds in a principal amount not to exceed \$9,500,000 to finance additions to and renovations of the District's school facilities.
- Approval was given for 2018-2019 ESU8 contracts (Distance Learning, Nursing Services, Special Education, and Technology
- Approve NETA for Instructional Staff In-Service 2019.
- The 2018-2019 academic school year calendar was approved as
- Approved the 2018-2019 contract for Principal Darrell Barnes.
- Approved the 2018-2019 contract amendment for Superintendent Mikal Shalikow.
- The meeting was adjourned at 8:24 p.m.

From the Desk of Superintendent Mikal Shalikow

In response to phone calls, text messages, and emails from a media contact, the Chief Deputy State Fire Marshal - Sean Lindgren and Deputy State Fire Marshal - Todd Brehm conducted a Fire and Life Safety inspection of our educational facilities. During this inspection, they uncovered several Life Safety Code and Fire Code deficiencies. Some of the major deficiencies included the lack of fire barrier separation for stairways, the lack of fire barrier separation of hazardous areas, lack of proper rescue windows in classrooms where required, inadequate fire alarm devices, improper electrical wiring uses, and lack of means of egress signage and emergency lighting. These violations would need to include installation of fire sprinkler systems in the 7-12 building as well as the entire elementary school.

The work of correcting many of the smaller issues has already been completed. There are several items that will require the district to spend significant dollars to correct. A plan of correction will be provided as directed by the Chief Deputy State Fire Marshal. The board did pass a resolution on February 12, 2018 to bring the \$9.5 million bond to public vote at the May primaries. If the bond passes, most all of the larger Life Safety Code violations would be addressed.

We have had several calls from concerned parents about taking learning materials, student artwork and other student projects off the walls in the Elementary. Paragraph 10.2.5.3 of NFPA 101®, Life Safety Code®, limits bulletin boards, posters, and paper attached directly to the walls to not more than 20 percent of the wall area. Teachers have been working hard at complying with this Life Safety Code, and unfortunately this is why students art work and teacher decorations have been removed.

There are several things that will need to be done prior to starting school in 2018-2019. The school board has not had a lot of time to discuss options or formulate a plan. It will be extremely difficult to hold school in the current elementary building in its existing condition. The report specifically states "Student occupancy shall not be approved in the lower level classrooms for the 2018-2019 school year if the existing conditions remain." The board will be working diligently over the next couple of months to formulate a plan of action to address these needs.

NSCAS Summative Testing and the ACT

The next window for the testing of English Language Arts (ELA), Math, and Science begins on March 19 with the ending date of April 27. Grades 3-8 will take Math and ELA tests while grades 5 & 8 will be taking the Science test. These tests will be spread out during the window of testing with most of the testing taking place in April.

All Juniors or third year high school students will be taking the ACT test, which measures college preparedness, in place of the NSCAS tests. The ACT will be given April 3rd. This test score will count and can be sent to colleges just as the tests that are normally given on Saturdays during the year. This test is given at no cost to the parents and has the same rules and regulations as the Saturday ACT tests. At the school, we have given all those students taking the ACT access to ACT Online Prep which they can work on from any device. Please encourage your student to take advantage of this tool to help them gain a good score. Teachers in some classes will also be using this to address parts of the ACT to help prepare our students to do well. Doing well on this test opens the door to some very good scholarships for your students. A score of 27 or higher on any ACT test taken will also get your name posted on the ACT board at the school.

In order for your student to be prepared for these tests, we ask that, as parents, you encourage your child to get enough sleep and to eat breakfast so they can be fully rested and mentally prepared for the tests. We appreciate your efforts in helping your students and the school perform at the highest level possible.

Student Reading

Reading, allows us to take trips to places we have never been! Encourage your child to read by setting the example for them, taking them to the library, asking questions about what they have read, asking where they want to 'visit' next with a book.

Consistent reading improves vocabulary and increases fluency. If your child isn't old enough to read, take this time to read to them and as they learn, have your child read to you. Reading is a fun and educational way to bond with your children. Quality time!

One Meal A Day

Did you know that children who regularly eat meals with their families tend to do better in school and avoid risky behavior? Many years ago, in my sociology class the students were asked to get their families to sit and eat together at least one meal a day. The students reported that it increased communication between kids and parents. The events of the day were discussed and led to more interest in what was going on in each other's lives. The vast majority of students worked on trying to continue having that one meal together. It's worth a try!

FIVE REASONS WHY DEADLINES ARE LIFELINES FOR STUDENTS

There is a charming story from years ago about a small frog who fell into a pothole on a busy road. Although he tried, he couldn't jump high enough to hop out. One by one, fellow critters heard him croaking for help as they walked by. Each one promised to find someone bigger than they were to reach down and pull him to safety. An hour later, those critters were in the woods debating who could help, when they saw the little frog hopping toward them.

"Hey, how did you get here? I thought you were stuck in that pothole!" the animals asked.

"I was," replied the frog. "But I was able to hop out."

"But, you're so small. I thought it was impossible."

"Me, too," the frog said. "But I heard a huge truck coming from a distance, and I had to get out!"

For years, this little fable has reminded me of the power of incentive. There are loads of things we think we can't do, until the time comes and we have to. At that point, we often discover the ability was in us the entire time. We just never put it to the test.

And this is especially true for our students.

An All Too Familiar Story

I have very dear friends who learned this recently. Their son, Liam, just graduated from college and moved back home for a season. Liam's dad met with him, man-to-man, and talked about the excitement of launching into his career, into his own apartment (and eventually a home) and learning to provide for himself. In those meetings Liam was visibly eager to set some goals and deadlines for moving out and starting on his own.

That is, until Mom had a conversation with him. While running errands one day, Liam began to share what he and his dad had talked about. Missing the cue that he was excited about this big step, Mom said, "Well, let's just see how things go. You can stay with us as long as you want to, sweetheart."

Those words, while warm and well-intentioned, do not Let's help them create deadlines that become lifelines. help a boy become a man.

The next thing he knew, Liam was telling dad he needed to stay longer, trying to find the perfect job and the right apartment before "launching." Dad asked about the new plan and discovered Liam wasn't feeling as sure about himself as he had earlier. He was hesitant, less confident and apprehensive that he could do it. While Mom's words were very comforting and nurturing—she did not realize how they stole ambition and incentive from her son.

Five Gifts That Deadlines Provide for Young People

You and I probably both agree that Mom was simply

trying to furnish a "safety net." All parents desire to offer such security to their young adult children. Without a goal to reach and a deadline to meet, however, that "safety net" can become a "hammock," says financial advisor Dave Ramsey. This merciful approach sounds so right; so loving. But real love calls out the best in someone if we know it is there.

When leading teens or young adults, we must remember—deadlines can be lifelines for them. They can be the source of energy for initiative. In fact, deadlines:

- Create incentive and ambition. Given in the right spirit, deadlines can provide a sense of urgency and ambition to get the job done, just like the frog in the story above. It's amazing how resilient we can be when we have to be.
- Force resourcefulness in us. The more resources people have, the less resourceful they tend to become—for all of us. Deadlines can push a young person to be creative as they solve problems for themselves.
- Help us prioritize. When we are forced to make something happen, we quickly discover what our real priorities are. In Liam's case, he learned what he needed and what he didn't need in a new apartment.
- Can generate confidence in us. When a deadline is set for us and there is belief expressed that we can meet it, it's empowering. We can borrow some of their belief and start to feel capable of taking on adult responsibility.
- Empower us to focus our life. Deadlines cultivate clarity in our thinking that isn't there when there are loads of options. The human spirit can face all kinds of adversity when focused on what's most important and valuable.

I was 21 years old when I married my wife, Pam. She was 19. We weren't completely privy to all that marriage entails, but we struck out on our own. I finished my senior year of college, while working a full-time job. We both have parents who loved us enough to say—we believe in you. Call if you need us, but enjoy the satisfaction of striking out on your own. In the first two years, we ate mac and cheese a lot, and had two pieces of furniture, and a used table someone gave to us. They were the greatest days of our lives. Our secret? We learned to lean on each other, get the support of a community we established around us and we set goals and deadlines for ourselves. I became a man during that time—self-sufficient and able to self-regulate because Mom and Dad didn't step in.

Instead, deadlines stepped in. Always remember...

- Students *learn* on a need-to-know basis.
- Students act on a need-to-initiate basis.

Visit Colleges

- Seniors should be in the application, financial aid, and scholarship process of attending colleges they are going to or seriously considering.
- Juniors should visit a college they are interested in.
- College representatives frequently visit Newman Grove High School. Encourage your student to visit with these reps to get a feel for the college they are representing.

Social Studies Classes

Each class is doing CNN 10 everyday. This is listening to current news stories for ten minutes. They all need to write about one of the topics explaining what the topic was about and their opinion on the topic and why they think it is hurting us or helping us as America.

<u>World History</u> is a class of 3 students. We have covered numerous countries and are presently studying the Qin Empire of China. We went into depth on their form of government and how they were able to use a differing weights and measure system, a different writing system but yet were able to make an effective set of law codes to govern their people and to build roads and canals that were of high quality. Their skills and system were so well defined they were able to build the Great Wall of China without modern machinery.

It is a great year in <u>American Government</u>. The 14 senior students learned first hand about people running for President by listening to the debates and the critiquing that goes on after the debate. We were able to share verbal ideas with one another and then discuss what the duties of the president or senator consist of and the compensation and benefits each member of government receives. With a little more time in prep work for this class and using actual events, we are able to have some great discussions and learning without a lot of paperwork on the students part. We are doing current events each week to get them to know what is going on in our world today.

Seven juniors in <u>American History</u> are studying and researching World War I. They study the reasons United States became involved in this war, who was on our side, and who was the enemy. Another interesting feature of this war, was the use of trench warfare, which was necessary because of the weapons that were used to fight the war.

The **7**th **Grade Nebraska History** class has 12 students. They have worked on reading maps like the Nebraska state map. They had to find towns and distances and other items. We have studied the Indians of Nebraska, like where they lived, how they lived and what did they lived in. They made a teepee or earth lodge and presented their Indian tribe of Nebraska. We have started with Europe and are now on North and South Korea. We do maps and Lizardpoint to study the countries.

The two students in <u>World Geography</u> are currently studying US and Canada. The online system called Lizardpoint.com is being used to do the map testing for this class. In our studies we seek out how landscapes affect the populations and cultures of US and Canada. They have been drawing maps to get a better understanding of the climates and population. They did a project on the North American Free Trade Agreement (NAFTA).






