I hope everyone had a Merry Christmas and will have a happy new year. This month brings much excitement and many tasks to be completed by seniors planning on attending college. The first task that should be completed is obtaining a PIN number for the FASFA. This is done at the web-site <u>www.pin.ed.gov</u> Both the student and parents need a PIN. Your PIN is an electronic access code that serves as your personal identifier and can be used every year to electronically apply for federal student aid and to access your U.S. Department of Education records online. Parents, if you have already obtained a PIN for previous children, then you do not need another one. You can use the same one for all children. Students must have their own. Do not lose your PIN as you will need it through out your college years.

After receiving your PIN, you should apply for federal student financial assistance by completing the FASFA. Even if you do not need financial assistance, everyone should fill out the FASFA because colleges use this information in helping with many other things such as scholarships. Federal student loan interest rates are lower than any other loans so you are encouraged to fill out the FASFA to see what you qualify for. The fastest way to fill out the FASFA and to get results back is to do it online electronically. The web-site is www.fafsa.ed.gov A FAFSA on the Web Worksheet is available online at www.fafsa.ed.gov or www.FederalStudentAid.ed.gov/pubs for you to print and write down your information prior to completing the online submission of the FAFSA. You can obtain printed copies of the worksheet by calling 1-800-4-FED-AID (1-800-433-3243). Apply for the FASFA between Jan. 1, 2015 and June 30, 2015. Be aware that colleges may have their own deadlines which usually can be as early as February. You do need to have your income tax information finished or close to finished to apply. There is a tool at www.fafsa.ed.gov called the FAFSA4caster that can help students and families prepare financially for college before officially applying for federal student aid. It provides an estimate of federal student aid eligibility by instantly calculating an estimated Expected Family Contribution* - the indicator used to estimate a family's or a student's ability to contribute toward the cost of an education after high school.

Information that you will need to fill out the FASFA

- Social Security #
- 2014 W-2 forms and other records of money earned by student and parents, if you're a dependent student
- 2014 Federal Tax Returns and W2's
- A PIN number for both parent and student (<u>www.pin.ed.gov</u>)
- 2014 untaxed income records examples include Social Security benefits, welfare benefits such as Temporary Assistance to Needy Families (TANF) and veteran benefits.
- Current bank statements, business and investment mortgage information; business and farm records; and stock, bond and other investment records.
- Alien registration number (if you are not a U.S. citizen).
- <u>The Education Quest website (www.educationquest.org) gives great tutorials for filling out the FASFA. It goes</u> over each question and helps answer any questions you may have.
- A link to the FASFA and Education Quest websites are posted on our school website.

Other important information

- You should never pay to fill out the FAFSA. Check the web address to make sure it ends in .gov
- I have a booklet "Funding Education Beyond High School" that students or parents can pick up. Many parents have picked these up from previous meetings.

Scholarships

- An updated list of scholarships is available in the counseling office for students to pick up and on our school website. Local scholarships should be coming soon.
- Many colleges have a February 1st or earlier deadline. For example, Northeast Community College's deadline is Feb. 1st. Please check with all the colleges you are applying to so you so not miss out on scholarship opportunities.
- Please notify me of any Scholarships earned so that proper recognition can be given at graduation. This includes all scholarships won, even those not accepted.

WHAT'S BETTER THAN A COMPETITIVE SPIRIT?

Oregon quarterback, Marcus Mariota, is one of the nicest college athletes you'll ever meet. His talent is unquestioned, as this year's winner of the Heisman trophy. His teammates talk, however, about how restrained he is; how he picks up his own and other people's trash on the ground; how he hands out food to homeless guys on the streets; how he encourages people; and how he volunteers at a Boys and Girls Club each week. He has a habit of holding the door open for strangers. Stories of his graciousness are ubiquitous. He thanks fans for appreciating him every single game. And to top it all off, when he gets sacked in a game, he often gets up and pats his tackler on the shoulder, saying, "Nice hit."

These character traits have scouts and others questioning whether Marcus has the "killer" instinct to play in the NFL. One anonymous pro scout even suggested in *Sports Illustrated* last month that Mariota might be "too nice."

All of this leads to a very important question: All talent being equal, is a killer instinct the most important trait an athlete can possess?

What's More Important Than a Competitive Spirit or "Killer Instinct"?

Please understand that I get the importance of a competitive spirit— or what some call the "killer instinct." I realize it can give one player an emotional edge over another who doesn't have it. And let's face it:. emotions play a huge role, especially in college athletics. They can work for you or against you.

Which is exactly my point here. I believe Marcus Mariota might possess something even more important than an emotional killer instinct. If you watch him, you have no doubt he's a competitor. In fact, at one point this season, when he felt his teammates were not playing up to the standard of excellence they agreed upon, he got in their faces and challenged them in an unmistakably vocal way.

But Marcus possesses something more valuable than a killer instinct: **control**. In a world where few can control their emotions (and often become slaves to them), Mariota seems to have mastered his, which allows him to both pick up trash others have left on the ground, or stay poised late in the fourth quarter after he's been sacked and go on to throw a perfect touchdown pass. To master oneself is of utmost importance. Self-control in all situations is what Marines and Navy Seals teach their members. It's level-headed self-leadership at its finest, to keep your head in every circumstance. Consider this: to play with emotion can boost drive and performance, but it can also lead to behavior that's out of control. It's a crapshoot. The killer instinct can lead to scores—or it can lead to penalties, injuries, conflict, misbehavior and even crime.

So a *controlled* spirit is more valuable than a competitive spirit. It can fight and win... or it can contain itself when needed. Psychologists call it *emotional intelligence*—the ability to manage one's emotions. You see it in so many great athletes: Tim Duncan in the NBA, Peyton Manning in the NFL, and Derek Jeter in the MLB, who retired this year having never been ejected from a game. Each one of these players has the respect of teammates and opponents alike.

The Four Ingredients in a Controlled Spirit

Athletes who develop a controlled spirit possess these four traits:

1. Self-discipline

They can do what they must, even when they don't feel like it.

- 2. **Emotional Security** They're inwardly secure and don't need to compare or get defensive.
- 3. Core Values or Principles

They live by a set of timeless principles that helps them make decisions easier.

4. Clear Identity

They have a strong sense of identity and know their strengths and weakness.

I have no doubt Marcus Mariota has a competitive spirit. You can't be ranked in the top five football teams in the country (or win the Heisman Trophy) without having one. I just believe his controlled spirit is what makes him most valuable.

What sort of flu season are we having?

Influenza A (H3N2) viruses are most common so far. H3N2-predominant seasons have been associated with more severe illness and mortality, especially in older people and young children.



Influenza (also known as the flu) is a contagious respiratory illness caused by flu viruses. It can cause mild to severe illness, and at times can lead to death. The flu is different from a cold. The flu usually comes on suddenly. People who have the flu often feel some or all of these symptoms:

Fever* or feeling feverish/chills
Cough
Sore throat
Runny or stuffy nose
Muscle or body aches
Headaches
Fatigue (tiredness)
Some people may have vomiting and diarrhea, though this is more common in children than adults.
□ It's important to note that not everyone with flu will have a fever.

How to avoid getting the flu, avoid close contact, stay home when you are sick. Use tissue when sneezing or coughing, best is to sneeze into your elbow. WASH HANDS OFTEN, use soap and hot water and scrub for 30 seconds; don't touch your eyes, nose or mouth as germs on your hands could infect you, use hand sanitizer when soap and water aren't available.

Let me tell you a little about what the students in first semester have completed and what is to come for those in second semester.

In Yearbook, we have planned the layout and cover for the book and are starting the process of working with a company artist to get it fine-tuned and looking just perfect. We have gathered and created as much of the following as possible for yearbook pages: titles, subtitles, photos, captions for photos, background images, and quotes for each of the 112 pages. We also have written interview questions, completed some of the interviews, and written stories where possible. The designing and organization of pages are probably things most people would expect out of this class; but there is much more. We also have contacted prospective advertisers and gone through the billing process; maintained the hallway display which shows announcements, shares photos, and displays current weather; taken photos at as many events and activities as possible; and something new for us this year, the online streaming of some of our activities and events. We currently are working on providing archives of the events and activities we have streamed. Please be sure to check frequently at http://striv.tv/channel/newman-grove/ to see if an activity or event you may be interested in is being streamed live or has been archived.

As the yearbook students left the classroom, they were greeted by 16 Freshmen who were coming to the lab for **Communica-tions Technology**. This is the class where the students reviewed and refined their Internet surfing and searching skills; created a very simple web page by using HTML Code; explored current technology and looked into what technology may provide in the future; discussed security, privacy, safety, and ethics in relation to technology and it's use; completed the digital citizenship training that was started in elementary and middle school; learned to create word processing documents that included headers and footers, merged fields, SmartArt graphics, and tables; experienced setting up database files to create, organize, and quickly recall information; and created spreadsheets where data could be expressed through various types of charts.

As the Freshmen headed to lunch, it was time for the 7th Grade to make their way in to the lab for **Keyboarding 7**. Since this was the first class that they had that was dedicated solely to learning how to operate various programs on the computer. They had set up their Gmail the end of their 6th Grade year, so this was a good place to start by reviewing how to get in to that account. Then, they learned how to use the Google Document part of their account to create a word processing document. Once their document was created, they learned to share it through electronic means; thus, no printouts. Once they became comfortable with that process; then it was time to plan, practice, and record their instructional video, which they eventually uploaded to YouTube. While students were working one at a time on their instructional videos, the rest of the class started to work their way through beginning word processing concepts ranging from copying, pasting, and formatting documents to preparing a full research paper with citations and references. After learning the basic word processing concepts and before creating the research paper, the students were introduced to using spreadsheets to present numerical data in a format that is easily interpreted, which is usually through charts. They were also introduced to creating formulas in the spreadsheets to make them more efficient. The students spent a little time each week keeping their proofreading skills sharp; and spent some time each week of the last month of class learning some of the basic concepts and components of game programming through a website called Gamestar Mechanic. These students accomplished a lot in their short 50 minutes each day!

During first quarter the lab was populated by the **Multimedia Technology** class consisting of the ten seniors as they learned concepts, software, and apps that involved image capture and editing, video capture and editing, audio capture and editing, web page construction, collage and/or comic strip construction, infographic creation, online poster, flyer, and presentation creation, changing a still image to a speaking image, avatar creation, and researching a technology topic of their choice. The have all shared their Web ePorfolio, which displays the 18 projects they created the software, website, or app that was used to create the project; and the steps they used to complete the project with me, their classmates, and a panel of two staff members. They also now have an ePortfolio that represents their technology skills that they can used for reference or to share with prospective employers.

As we are starting a new semester, the multimedia lab will now be filled with new combinations of students that will be taking one or more of the following classes: Computer Applications, where we will complete the creation of the 2014-2015 yearbook; Micro-computer Applications (formerly named Articulated Technology) that can now be taken for high school credit, college credit, or both; and another new adventure: 6th Grade Computers.

This semester will also find me across the street training the elementary students in digital citizenship. We also plan to continue to integrate some programming or coding introduction through an iPad app named Kodable and maybe others.

Our students continue to use their technology skills they have gained and continue to gain in and out of school. They also use these skills as they navigate their MAPs tests both at the beginning and and at the end of the year, take their statewide writing assessments the end of January, and take their NeSA tests the end of April.

Technology, like many tools, can be used for good and/or bad. We work hard to help your children, our students, understand how far-reaching inappropriate behavior through the many avenues of social media can be through digital citizenship training. We also hope to help them realize that technology can be a very productive tool in addition to a link to their social world.
