Board of Education Meeting Summary March 10, 2014

- Meeting called to order at 6:05 p.m.
- The agenda was approved as published; minutes of the February 10th meeting were approved as printed.
- The Treasurer's Report was accepted as presented.
- Claims were approved for payment in the amounts of \$32,230.97 (General Fund), \$1,090.90 (Depreciation Fund) and \$610.00 (Building Fund).
- Received reports from Tami Texley (Music and ELL) and Karla Patzel (Activities Director).
- Science and Ag Education faculty were present to discuss applying for a grant from Monsanto. The grant, along with other funding, would be used to construct a greenhouse for various educational programs. The Board voted to approve the application for a \$10,000 grant.
- Approved the 2014-2015 school calendar.
- Approved a request by Karen Herchenbach for a local substitute teaching certificate.
- Approved the current summer maintenance projects list
- Correspondence from Elba Schools was reviewed regarding request for unification. President Fowlkes will respond, declining this request.
- Accepted the resignation of Amy Nelson as elementary teacher, effective at the end of the current school year.
- Received a report from Principal Moser: Elementary teachers reviewing reading series for the 2014-15 school year, Department of Education Special Education file review (positive report), NeSA writing, math and science testing window extended due to computer difficulties at NDE, and working on meeting staffing needs for the 2014-15 school year.
- Received a report from Superintendent Pokorny: NRCSA Conference to be held March 20-21 in Kearney, tire recall on several Ford vans, legislation, and correspondence with St. Edward Schools regarding coop possibilities.
- Entered into Executive Session at 7:32 p.m. to discuss a situation to prevent needless injury to the reputation of an individual in compliance with the law. Returned to Public Session at 8:10 p.m.
- The meeting was adjourned at 8:11 p.m.

Do you recognize the icons above?? If you don't, I guarantee that your kids do. If you have a facebook account, you are behind the times as it is being replaced by the above social media sites. Tumblr, Instagram and Snapchat are all sites that kids are using these days. You are supposed to be 13 years or older in order to be able to use these sites. Vine is another site, but a user is supposed to be 17 years or older to use this. Vine is an app that kids under 17 should stay clear of as it contains very adult content. There are many dangers regarding social media.

Recently I attended a session educating parents, teachers, and students about the dangers of social media. This presentation was given by school lawyer, Karen Haase. Haase told listeners that the actual cell phones are not bad, it is the decisions that people make with them that makes them bad. Karen told the kids that they need to make sure they are positive they know who they are talking to on a site and if they are not sure, they should take that person off of their list and no longer have any type of communication with them. The problem is, we have many young people who make all of their information public which allows "predators" to easily find children of a specific age. They then establish a relationship with that child and at some point in time may try to abduct or molest the child. As parents, you need to be taking your child's electronic device(s) and check them to be sure they are on appropriate sites and that they are not making all of their personal information "public". You also need to be sure that they are not posting pictures of themselves and making those "public" as well. Almost every app gives you the option of making your information public or private. You would be surprised how many kids do not use the privacy settings and many parents are not aware of it. Not only is this to protect them as children but to also help them understand that when they go to apply to potential employers someday, they don't want an employer to see some sort of inappropriate picture of them. Once a picture is sent to someone else, it is on the internet and there for all of the world to see, especially if that person decides to forward it on to four more people and so on and so forth. Parents need to know your child's usernames and passwords for all of the apps they use so that you can view the pictures they post to their site and also know what kind of information they are putting on their account. Just as you are entitled to walk into your child's room at home and check to see that they are making good decisions, this username and password opens up that door so that you can see that they are making good decisions in cyberspace. You do have every right to look through your child's electronic devices and need to do so on a regular basis. I encourage you to collect your child's electronic devices at night so that they are getting a good night's sleep. The kitchen table is a great spot for this. Many students stay up very late calling and instant messaging friends. This time could instead be better spent studying or sleeping. If a student is using their cell phone to bully another student, even outside of school hours, they can be subject to school discipline, including suspension. If the texting or imaging is causing a student to be unable to attend or concentrate in school, the sender of these messages, images can be subject to administrative consequences. Newman Grove Senior Center Scholarship – (1-\$1,000 or 2-\$500), GPA of 2.5. Low-Income family. Senior Center trustee to help with selection.

R. Craig Nelsen Memorial Ag Scholarship – (1- \$500), GPA of 3.0, farm background)

Newman Grove FFA Alumni Scholarship-(1-\$200), Pick up application blank and return it to the Agriculture Education Instructor.

All scholarship applications are judged not only according to the above criteria but also on academic achievement, activity participation, student's work ethic, and personal integrity.

<u>Unless</u> otherwise stated, the deadline for applications is April 1. <u>Unless</u> otherwise stated, pick up application from the school counselor. <u>Unless</u> otherwise stated, return completed applications to the school counselor.

Other important information

- 1. You should never pay to fill out the FASFA. Check the web address to make sure it ends in gov.
- 2. I have a booklet "Funding Education Beyond High School" that students or parents can pick up.
- 3. The Education Quest website (<u>www.educationquest.org</u>) gives great tutorials for filling out the FASFA. It goes over each question and helps answer any questions you may have.
- 4. A link to the FASFA and Education Quest websites are posted on our school website.
- Seniors should visit and then apply to colleges they are seriously considering.
- 6. Northeast Community College is offering some free assistance through their Financial Aid Office at the College Welcome Center on Fridays from 1pm -4pm starting February and going through June 2014 with no appointment necessary (excluding days the college is closed). They are also offering this same service on Saturday February 22nd from 9am-1pm by appointment only. Number to call is 1-800-844-7285. You will need to the following information: 2013 Federal Tax Returns and W2's and a PIN number for both parent and student (www.pin.ed.gov)
- 7. An updated list of scholarships is available in the counseling office for students to pick up. There is also a link on our school web-site. <u>Bluejay Foundation and Local scholarship packets were distributed to all seniors</u>. All these scholarships have an April 1st deadline.
- 8. Please notify me of any Scholarships won so that proper recognition can be given at graduation. This includes all scholarships won from colleges, even those not accepted.



Know the facts before having a discussion about peer pressure with your teen

In order to prepare your teen to combat peer pressure, you have to know what she is being pressured to do. A survey by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention found that teens are often being pressured on the topics of:

- Smoking. Nearly 25% of high school students smoke cigarettes.
- **Drinking.** A whopping two-thirds of teens between 14 and 17 have tried alcohol.
- Drugs. A little more than 25% of 14- to 17-year-olds reported that they have used illegal drugs.
- Sex. Just about one in every three teens aged 14 to 15 has had sexual intercourse.

Think about your family values regarding these issues. Then, rather than banning your teen from leaving the house, have a conversation with your teen about why you feel the way you feel. Knowing *why* you don't want her smoking, drinking or involved in other risky behaviors may be just enough to encourage your teen to say *no* to her friends.




Newman Grove FFA Competition Results




Do Pacifiers and Sippy Cups Cause Speech Delay?

People often ask me, "Should I use a pacifier with my child?"

As a speech pathologist and a new mom to my first child, I had resolved to never use a pacifier with my son. I didn't want to have to worry about weening him off of it knowing the effects pacifiers can have on speech development. A few



Understand that pacifiers are perfectly appropriate for infants the first year of their life. They can also make life a lot easier on mom and dad at first. Don't feel guilty if your baby loves the "binki". Do however try to limit his or her use of the pacifier after 6 months of age and work toward weening them completely off the pacifier by 12 months. When you give your baby the pacifier try to always give a soft toy or blanket with it. This helps when it comes time to ween the baby off the pacifier. Your baby girl or boy will still have the comfort of the toy or blanket when the pacifier is taken away.

What about sippy cups?

I don't recommend sippy cups because sippy cups can prevent the tongue from moving into a more natural position for speech development. Children suckle the sippy cup just like they would a pacifier or bottle. When it comes time to ween off the bottle try moving to a straw cup instead.

Why a straw cup?

As a mother I know we all like the spill proof cups so I recommend the spill proof straw cup as a transition cup from the bottle or nursing. This will help position your children's tongue correctly for speech and give them the strength necessary to be more successful communicators. Of course before you introduce a straw cup you need to make sure your child can drink from a straw.



How do I teach my child to drink from a straw?•

If your child is having difficulty learning to drink from a straw try using a Capri Sun or juice box to teach your child the concept of straw drinking. With a Capri Sun you can squeeze the juice up the straw to teach your child that this new tool is used for drinking. Before you know it your child will be suckling the straw and drinking on his/her own. The downfall with this approach is that you will have to hold the Capri Sun the whole time unless you are o.k. with juice everywhere. Another less messy method would be to use a honey bear with a reusable plastic straw.

What straw cup do you like best?

My favorite cups are the "Munchkin" cups (shown above), which are sold at stores like Wal-Mart or Costco. You can also get these from Amazon.com. I like these cups the best because of the shape of the straw and the location of the anti-spill mechanism. The shape of the straw promotes good lip rounding which is beneficial for the /w/ and "oo" sounds. The anti-spill mechanism is located inside the cup rather than in the straw itself so when you begin cutting the straw down, which I'll explain below, you won't cut it off.

If children learn to drink from a straw by suckling how is it different from a sippy cup?

A straw cup can be used as a tool to train the tongue into the right position. These are the steps you will want to follow.

Once you have purchased a straw cup allow your child several weeks to get used to the new cup. Keep in mind they are now drinking all their liquids from this cup. After the child is really comfortable with the new cup cut 1/4" off the top of the straw. This will make it so the child will have less straw to put in their mouth while drinking. A few weeks later, when your child is really comfortable drinking from this cup cut another 1/4" off the top of the straw. Every few weeks repeat this step until your child only has about 1/4" of straw left they can put in their mouth. This assures that they cannot suckle the straw and their tongues will be in the proper position for good speech development.

"Why have my other children done just fine on sippy cups?"

There are many children out there that can drink from sippy cups without affecting their speech. But, if you can set your children up for success from the beginning why wouldn't you? If you have already gone the route of sippy cups and your child substitutes /t/ for /k/, /d/ for /g/, -th- for /s/ or /z/, or has a lateral lisp your child will benefit from moving their tongue back with the help of a straw cup. Excessive drooling can also be an indicator that your child needs the strengthening that can come from drinking through straws. As a rule, my children only use straw cups as opposed to sippy cups and I encourage my clients to do the same.

"What about drinking from a normal cup?"

Drinking from a normal cup will also promote appropriate tongue positioning. Introduce normal cups as soon as you feel your child is ready. If you want to teach your child to drink from a normal cup make sure they are not supporting the cup with their tongue. If they seem to lose a lot of fluid while drinking help them practice by giving them single sips while you hold the cup.


Developmental Milestones for Communication

Every child is unique and has an individual rate of development. This chart from http://asha.org represents, on average, the age by which most children will accomplish the listed skills. Children typically do not master all items in a category until they reach the upper age in each age range. Just because your child has not accomplished one skill within an age range does not mean the child has a disorder. However, if you have answered no to the majority of items in an age range, seek the advice of an ASHA-certified speech-language pathologist or audiologist.

Israel's Eilat-Hevel Eilot Renewable Energy Company and the Eilat campus of Ben-Gurion University is sponsoring the third Sustainergy Workshop in Eilat, Israel, November 27-December 2, 2014. The goal of Sustainergy is to encourage the interest of young scientists in sustainability, renewable energy, alternative fuels, and energy efficiency.
