Board of Education Meeting Summary March 9, 2014

- Meeting called to order at 6:00 p.m.
- The agenda was approved as published.
- Minutes of the **February 9, 2015** meeting were approved as printed.
- The Treasurer's Report was approved as presented.
- Claims were approved for payment in the amounts of \$38,897.63 (General Fund), \$2,187.64 (Depreciation Fund), and \$5,872.68 (Building Fund).
- Curriculum reports were received from Eric Albers (Physical Education/Health), Michele Schmidt (Technology/Computer Education), and Tim Rossow (Business Education).
- Report given on recent Building and Grounds Committee meeting. Members discussed pursuing a feasibility study to determine immediate and future needs of the district.
- Principal Barnes reported on the conclusion of the winter sports season, the current speech season, assembly at Boone Central on **April 14th**, spring sports season underway, and State FFA qualifiers.
- Superintendent Shalikow reported on feasibility study costs, 1:1 technology possibilities, greenhouse storage shed, and resignation by Dan Zoucha as head boys basketball coach.
- The April meeting will be held on Thursday, **April 9th** at noon.
- Approved the local substitute teaching certificate request of Brittany Pieke.
- Discussed and approved Policy 5004 (Option Enrollment) as written.
- Discussed Policy 5005 (Option Enrollment Transportation). No changes were made to the policy.
- Members approved a motion to continue the preschool program without a partnership with Head Start.
- Approval given to begin breakfast program for the 2015-16 school year a free test period from **May 11-20th**.
- Accepted the resignation of Laura Nelson at the conclusion of the current school year. Ms. Nelson has taught in the Newman Grove School District for 35 years.
- Approved the summer science enrichment program contracts of Mark Seier, Danielle Amen and Shelley Dunlap.
- Approved the summer elementary reading/math program contracts of Erin Forre and Karla Patzel.
- Approved the classified staff salary increases for 2015-16 as presented.
- Entered into Executive Session 8:06 p.m. to discuss personnel and staffing.
- Returned to Public Session at 9:02 p.m.

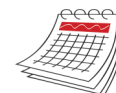

Superintendent Mikal Shalikow**

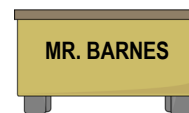

**Study Finds Reading to Children of All Ages Grooms Them
to Read More on Their Own**

In a 2014 survey of just over 1,000 children ages 6 to 17, only 31 percent said they read a book for fun almost daily, down from 37 percent four years ago.

There were some consistent patterns among the heavier readers: For the younger children—ages 6 to 11—being read aloud to regularly and having restricted online time were correlated with frequent reading; for the older children—ages 12 to 17—one of the largest predictors was whether they had time to read on their own during the school day.

The finding about reading aloud to children long after toddlerhood may come as a surprise to some parents who read books to children at bedtime when they were young but then tapered off. Last summer, the American Academy of Pediatrics announced a new policy recommending that all parents read to their children from birth.

"A lot of parents assume that once kids begin to read independently, that now that is the best thing for them to do," said Maggie McGuire, the vice president for a website for parents operated by Scholastic.

But reading aloud through elementary school seemed to be connected to a love of reading generally. According to the report, 41 percent of frequent readers ages 6 to 10 were read aloud to at home, while only 13 percent of infrequent readers were being read to.

Kenneth/Caroline Eng Scholarship - (2-\$3,000), GPA of 2.5. 1 scholarship awarded to student planning on attending Wayne State, other to any other college: Any degree pursued.

Newman Grove Senior Center Scholarship - (1-\$1,000 or 2-\$500), GPA of 2.5. Low-Income family. Senior Center trustee to help with selection.

R. Craig Nelsen Memorial Ag Scholarship - (1- \$500), GPA of 3.0, farm background)

Newman Grove FFA Alumni Scholarship - (varies on amount and #), Pick up application blank and return it to the Agriculture Education Instructor.

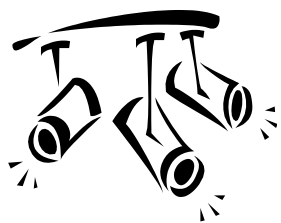
Boone Central Booster Club Scholarship - (4-\$250) (2-male, 2-female), Scholarship awards to be given to four graduating seniors who have been active in all the "COLORS" at Boone Central to be used within the following year at the college or technical school of their choice.

All scholarship applications are judged not only according to the above criteria but also on academic achievement, activity participation, student's work ethic, and personal integrity.

Unless otherwise stated, the deadline for applications is April 1. Unless otherwise stated, pick up application from the school counselor. Unless otherwise stated, return completed applications to the school counselor.

Other important information

1. You should never pay to fill out the FASFA. Check the web address to make sure it ends in gov.
2. I have a booklet "Funding Education Beyond High School" that students or parents can pick up.
3. The Education Quest website (www.educationquest.org) gives great tutorials for filling out the FASFA. It goes over each question and helps answer any questions you may have.
4. A link to the FASFA and Education Quest websites are posted on our school website.
5. Seniors should visit and then apply to colleges they are seriously considering.
6. Northeast Community College is offering some free assistance through their Financial Aid Office at the College Welcome Center on Fridays from 1pm -4pm starting February and going through June 2015 with no appointment necessary (excluding days the college is closed). Number to call is 1-800-844-7285. You will need to the following information: 2014 Federal Tax Returns and W2's and a PIN number for both parent and student (www.pin.ed.gov)
7. An updated list of scholarships is available in the counseling office for students to pick up. There is also a link on our school web-site.
8. Bluejay Foundation and Local scholarship packets were distributed to all seniors.
9. Please notify me of any Scholarships earned so that proper recognition can be given at graduation. This includes all scholarships earned from colleges, even those not accepted.

Know the facts before having a discussion about peer pressure with your teen



In order to prepare your teen to combat peer pressure, you have to know what she is being pressured to do. A survey by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention found that teens are often being pressured on the topics of:

- **Smoking.** Nearly 25% of high school students smoke cigarettes.
- **Drinking.** A whopping two-thirds of teens between 14 and 17 have tried alcohol.
- **Drugs.** A little more than 25% of 14- to 17-year-olds reported that they have used illegal drugs.
- **Sex.** Just about one in every three teens aged 14 to 15 has had sexual intercourse.

Think about your family values regarding these issues. Then, rather than banning your teen from leaving the house, have a conversation with your teen about why you feel the way you feel. Knowing *why* you don't want her smoking, drinking or involved in other risky behaviors may be just enough to encourage your teen to say *no* to her friends.

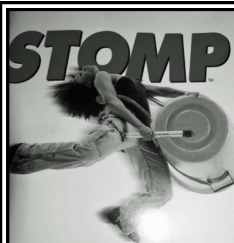

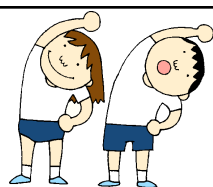


Trip to Lied Center

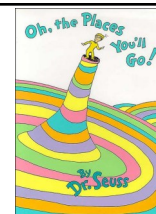




Stretching in Mrs. Rother's English and Spanish Classes

As we near the end of third quarter, English and Spanish classes are stretching toward more difficult concepts and skills in reading, writing, speaking, and thinking. And though students sometimes groan with the demands being placed on their "thinking muscles," they are continually achieving new heights.

Eighth graders have been working on the mechanics of writing (for example, punctuation and capitalization), reading skills, and descriptive writing. They have been reading poetry, short stories, and two novels, *Call of the Wild* and *Number the Stars*. These novels have challenged students to become more active readers, as well as provided them insight about the historical backgrounds of the Klondike Gold Rush and World War II.

Senior Literature and Composition students have studied short stories and several types of poetry. First there was the epic poem about the legendary hero Beowulf. Shortly after, we read excerpts from Chaucer's *Canterbury Tales*, a long series of narrative poems that illuminate much about life in the Middle Ages. Next we read several ballads. This is a type of poetry that was originally meant to be sung and was a staple of the Middle Ages. Students learned that ballads are still popular in the rock and country music songs in our contemporary lives. Seniors have also studied love sonnets written by master poets Spenser and Sydney as well as lyric poems written during the Renaissance. In addition, students have just finished reading one of Shakespeare's best-known tragedies, *Macbeth*. The culmination of this semester will be a PowerPoint presentation that features a poet the students have chosen to study extensively.

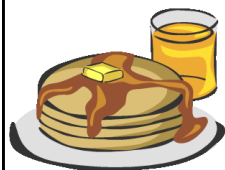
In speech class, we have been working on speaking skills such as enunciation, body language, vocal variety, and pacing. Students have presented an impromptu speech and a poetry program, and they are currently finishing up research to present in an informative speech. Next they will "tackle" a children's story, a project which will give them a light-hearted break from the seriousness of previous projects. In addition to speaking skills, students in this class develop research, analysis, and writing skills.

Spanish 2 class: what can I say? It's all about the verb! Well, not really, but the verbs are the most challenging aspect of foreign language study. We have worked our way through present and present progressive tenses, reflexive verbs, and preterit (past) tense so far; and we have a loooooong way to go before we are done with verbs! To break up the usual textbook lessons, students do several types of projects and presentations throughout the semester. They are currently making posters to illustrate their daily routines.

Yes, students are stretching toward the unknown, reaching higher and higher levels. It's been hard work but worth the effort. As we approach fourth quarter, I would like to commend my students for their hard work. I would also like to remind them of this message from Dr. Seuss: "Oh, the Places You'll Go! Congratulations! Today is your day. You're off to Great Places! You're off and away!" Don't stop stretching, kids.

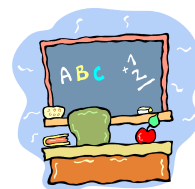
Aaron-"We have more lunch choices and get to move to our classes instead of sitting. We have lockers and get gym class with 7th and 8th grade. "

We had only two guys predicted to place that high with Isaac at 3rd seed and Joel at 4th. Many of the rest of the Cardinal wrestlers were predicted to be just out of the money. 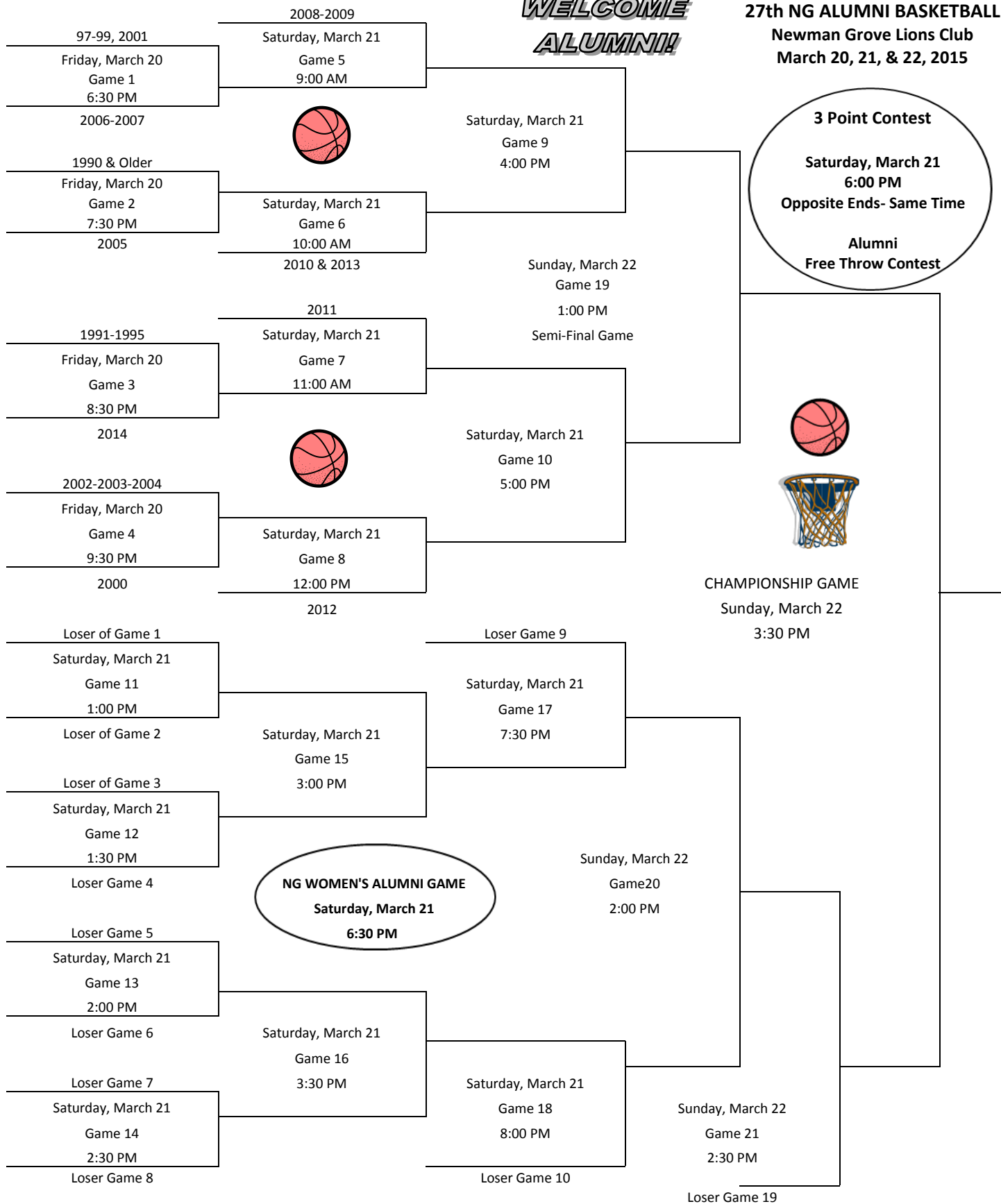
